Dear Friends,

Several years ago I was sitting in Hannaford parking lot in Lansingburgh, waiting for my husband to come out of the store with meat for supper. It was a warm day, and I had the window open. Gradually I became aware of two women standing in the parking lot gossiping about someone in their church.

Being a person interested in churches, my ears perked up, and I began to pay attention to what they were saying. They minced no words as they expressed their negative impressions of the person in question. To my surprise, my cheeks began to burn. At first I thought my reaction was due to the fact that even though I didn't know the person they were discussing, I was embarrassed for that person. Then I realized I was embarrassed for the Church.

Here were two church members who apparently were very involved in their Church. I was sure they loved God and were dedicated to those things that are pleasing to God, but not only did their behavior give a poor impression of their Church, thus discouraging others from joining, but also their gossiping was not behavior becoming to a Christian. Gossiping is included in the New Testament list of behaviors Christians are to avoid.

Sometimes when we're talking with people it's hard to know the difference between interesting conversation and gossip. Recently I saw a graphic that I thought helped to

make that distinction. The word THINK was spelled out, with each letter representing the beginning of a question. Before we say something about someone, we need to ask ourselves five questions: (1) Are our words Truthful? (2) Are our words Helpful? (3) Are our words Inspiring? (4) Are our words Necessary? (5) Are our words Kind? If we think about those questions before we talk about someone, we will usually find that we can pass #1 with flying colors, but fail miserably at #s 2-5.

All of us who claim the name of Christ need to take these words to heart. If we have been given the gift of gab, it can feel frustrating to have to weigh our words before we speak, but nothing less than the reputation of the Church, the reputation of others, and the joy of God, are at stake in the things we say.

## THE BIRTH OF MOTHER'S DAY

Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) loved her mother dearly. It was Miss Jarvis who first suggested a national day to honor all mothers. At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Anna gave a carnation, her mother's favorite flower, to each person in attendance. Within a few years, the idea to honor mothers gained popularity, and Mother's Day was soon observed annually in many large cities of the United States.

On May 9, 1914, by an act of congress, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday of May as Mother's Day. He established the day as a time for "public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country." By then, it had become customary to wear white carnations in honor of departed mothers and red carnations to honor the living. The custom continues to this day.

#### 10<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY INTERVIEW

This year marks the tenth anniversary of the Book Nook, and in honor of that occasion we are printing an interview with the Director of the Book Nook, Joy Mayo.

**Q:** How did the Book Nook get started?

A: It started ten years ago with Norma Smith who took some leftover Bargain Shed books and put them on a table. I said "As soon as we make \$100 we'll stop (doing this.) Then it was \$500." If we make \$10,000 can I quit?

Q: Where do you get the books?
A: Most of the books are people's donations. My next-door-neighbor is a librarian, and she gives me the left-over books from that library's books sales. The Ravena library also donates the books left over from their book sales. Other libraries donate books, as well.

**Q:** You are so welcoming and affectionate with people. Where does that come from?

**A:** From being a school teacher! You know that some people want hugs and others don't.

**Q:** You're very good at talking with people. How do you avoid it when people want to gossip?

**A:** I either pretend not to hear it, or I suddenly get very busy.

Q: What would you like people to know about the Book Nook?
A: All children get a free book every time they come. Books for nursing homes are free. Teachers may take up to 20 books per year for their

classrooms. Books sent to service personnel are free.

Q: What behind-the-scenes work do you do for the Book Nook?
A: I regularly check the internet to determine value for specific books.
There's a book-promotion service the church uses (for selling valuable books.) But if I can sell you a book for \$1, and you can turn around and sell it for \$5, we're both ahead, and I'm fine with that

Nineteenth-century evangelist Dwight L. Moody was walking down a New York City street, thinking about a sentence he'd heard: "The world has yet to see what God can do with a man who is wholly yielded to him."

Suddenly Moody felt a great yearning and cried out, "O God, make me that man!" He was so overwhelmed with God's love and with heartfelt passion to reach lost people that he had to stop at a friend's house to rest.

In *Birth of the Body*, Ray Stedman says this is what Luke is talking about when he describes the events of Pentecost. "When John the Baptist predicted that Jesus would come and baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire, he meant that there would be an unexplainable passion about the church."

As we feel the Pentecost passion, let's yield ourselves wholly to God and see what he does with us!


FYI, within the first week of its reopening, the Shed made \$303...that's only 4 days!




#### What you need:

- An adult to help
- 4 cotton balls
- Blue plastic cup
- Glue
- Scissors
- White paper
- Markers or crayons
- Fishing line (about 14")
- Paper clip

#### What you do:

- Set the cup upside down.
   Pull apart the cotton balls,
   forming cloud shapes, and
   glue them around the cup.
- 2. With an adult's help, poke a hole in the bottom of the cup.
- 3. On the paper, draw and cut out a Jesus figure.
  Color both sides.
- 4. Poke a hole atop Jesus, string fishing line through the hole and tie a knot.
- 5. String the other end through the hole in the cup. Tie the end to a paper clip.
- 6. Pull up the paper clip to take Jesus into the clouds.
